Elective Course: Health and Wellbeing During Disasters

Overview and Scope

Liaquat University of Medical and Health Sciences offers a non-credit elective course titled *Health and Wellbeing During Disasters*, designed to prepare young graduates for effective response in emergency and crisis situations. Offered by the Department of Community Medicine in collaboration with provincial health authorities, disaster management bodies, and partner organizations, the course strengthens students' competencies in disaster preparedness, emergency medical care, and public health management. It emphasizes the physical, psychological, and environmental challenges faced by affected populations and trains students to deliver timely, coordinated, and ethical healthcare services. Beyond classroom learning, the course integrates hands-on simulations, field exposure, and case-based exercises that develop practical problem-solving abilities. LUMHS's commitment extends far beyond academic training; the university actively deploys medical teams, mobile health units, and faculty volunteers to disaster-affected regions across Sindh, providing essential healthcare, disease surveillance, first aid, and psychosocial support. Through continuous collaboration with government agencies and humanitarian partners, LUMHS plays a vital role in strengthening community resilience, supporting emergency response efforts, and contributing to public health protection during floods, heatwaves, epidemics, and other crises.

- Trauma care in disaster settings
- Rapid assessment of health needs

4. Public Health in Disasters

- Communicable disease control
- Water, sanitation, hygiene (WASH)

- Nutrition and maternal-child health during emergencies

5. Mental Health and Psychosocial Support

- Psychological first aid
- Managing stress and trauma
- Supporting vulnerable groups

6. Logistics and Resource Management

- Coordination of relief supplies
- Field hospital operations
- Use of mobile medical units

7. Rehabilitation and Post-Disaster Recovery

- Community resilience and rebuilding
- Long-term health system recovery
- Monitoring and evaluation of interventions

8. Fieldwork, Case Studies, and Simulation Exercises

- Disaster drills
- Community outreach activities
